**MS:** I just go with what excites my spirit and usually things flow from there.

Three years ago I had a dream about a white horse. I woke up and felt like I had to find him. This turned into an obsessive vision of a white herd. One thing led to another and I read a story about the magical horses of Camargue, France. I knew right then and there that I had to go. Three month later, there I was! It happened fast and I had no doubts.

I will always be particularly fond of this unique experience. I owe it to the Camarque horses for having helped me create my first significant body of work.

"White, Power and Grace" is an almost surreal image collection I plan to keep on taking around the world as it speaks of emotion, power, grace and mystical beauty.


My home country, Romania, is also a very special place for me. Whenever I visit my family, I love traveling to the Northern highlands, with their magnificent mountain horses and soulful people. A cradle of pure magic where my experiences seem to be enhanced by an almost supernatural component.

**EE:** Many times you seem to get quite close to running horses. Isn't that dangerous? MS: While in Camarque France, I was standing at the tip of a small peninsula. The horses started to run towards me. I could hear the sound of their hooves and almost feel the ground vi-

I looked at the French guide accompanying me and asked whether I was going to be OK standing right in the horses' way... he told me not to worry, they would split around us. I simply trusted him...and them. They rushed and did exactly that, carefully avoiding us. They came really close, so I got splashed with mud from head to toe. I returned to the hotel and the receptionist asked me: "what happened to you"?

**EE:** You have been photographing people professionally for 10 years. How did the horses come into your life?



MS: My dad was born in a small Romanian mountain village. He grew up around horses, riding bareback through forests and creeks. I was privileged to spend my childhood summers in this magical place, surrounded by nature and animals. I watched calves and foals being born, making their fragile way into the world. I recall an overwhelming feeling of magic as I was connecting with something ever so gentle yet more powerful than I could comprehend. The experience remained engraved in my soul, despite the disconnect from this miraculous world once my grandparents had passed.

Many years later I came to Canada. I switched careers and started on my photographic path, which led to rediscovering the horses through a creative farm project outside of Toronto. All those wonderful childhood feelings came back and simply inundated my heart, leaving me in a state of deep joy and peace. just knew 'this was it'.

My creative work is fueled by a deep desire to reveal these animals' majestic beauty. In a way, it is also a tribute to my ancestors whose physical and spiritual connection with their horses runs in my blood.

**EE:** What are your plans for the future?

MS: I want to continue on with my travel projects, tell stories and make them available through my blog and of course, all other blogs and publications sharing them.

I will keep on creating equine art which is ultimately my personal homage to these gracious beings and what they represent.
